Winneshiek Medical Center Community Health Assessment July 2022

Overview and Executive Summary

A Community Health Assessment (CHA) is designed to gather information from the community to help guide/direct health planning activities. With this data, communities can map out a course for health improvement by creating strategies to make positive and sustainable changes. The survey process and results allow us to deepen our partnership with the communities we serve through a greater understanding of the health issues they face.

Winneshiek Medical Center started its CHA process in January 2022 with a target completion date of July 2022. This process does three things:

- Describes the state of health of a local population,
- Enables the identification of the major risk factors and causes of ill health, and
- Enables the creation of actions needed to address these factors

While the Assessment has been a common element required every five years of Iowa local boards of health (called a Community Health Assessment and Health Improvement Plan – CHA & HIP), the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requires the process be completed by every nonprofit hospital every three years to continue to qualify for federal tax exemption. For the 2022 survey cycle, Winneshiek Medical Center partnered with Winneshiek County Public Health to complete the survey.

Following a review of the population in Winneshiek County (IA) and Fillmore County (MN), Winneshiek Medical Center undertook a more in-depth approach to involving the community in identifying significant health needs. The main method to identify and prioritize health needs was the use of an online survey in March 2022, which was completed by 515 people.

The Community Health Assessment identified five overall priority categories of concern:

- Housing Options
- Mental Health Care*
- Older Adult Care*
- Alcohol and drug use*
- Suicide*

The five most prevalent diagnoses among respondents were:

- Vision problems
- Hypertension*
- Sleep apnea*
- Hearing problems*
- Respiratory problems*

The five highest areas of need for health care services, according to survey respondents were:

- Access to mental health care*
- Shelter and services for victims of abuse, violence and assault
- Alcohol and drug abuse prevention*

- Family planning services*
- Services for persons with disabilities

Section 1: Background – Past Community Health Assessment

Top issues identified/addressed in the 2019 Community Health Needs Assessment were:

Health Problems to Address:

- Mental Health: Problems, Access to services, Availability of local mental health providers
- Safe Behaviors: Illegal drug use/abuse/distribution, alcohol abuse, bullying, screen time (excessive use), parenting skills
- Health Care Access: High out-of-pocket costs, appointment availability to primary care
- Health Conditions/Prevention: Mental Health, Cancers, Obesity, Aging Problems (e.g. arthritis, hearing, vision loss, etc.), immunizations against communicable diseases

Health Behaviors to Improve:

- Physical Activity: Increase physical activity, offer affordable opportunities/programs/facility to exercise, more time and willpower to maintain health habits
- Healthy Eating: Eat more fruits and vegetables, Drink more water
- Decrease Stress

Section 2: Defining the Community Served

Population of Service Area

Winneshiek Medical Center is the primary provider for Winneshiek County (population 19,991) and southern Fillmore County (MN). It also draws patients from western Houston County (MN), eastern Howard County, western Allamakee County, and parts of Clayton, Fayette, and Chickasaw counties.

For the purpose of the Community Health Assessment, Winneshiek and southern Fillmore counties were the primary focus. Howard County, Allamakee County, Chickasaw and Fayette counties have critical access hospitals in their communities. Fillmore and Houston County (MN) do not.

Section 3: Assessing the Community's Health

Following a review of the population, past community health assessments and population health characteristics, Winneshiek Medical Center (WMC) undertook a more in-depth approach to involving the community in identifying significant health needs by partnering with Winneshiek County Public Health (WCPH). The main method to identify and prioritize health needs was the use of an online survey in March 2022, which was completed by 515 people.

WMC and WCPH communicated the purpose and availability of the survey through targeted email invitations, newspapers, online news, websites and Facebook pages.

Results of the survey were reviewed with WMC's administrative council, who then developed the set of improvement plans/actions. Others, including WMC's Management Committee, were consulted in refining the actions. Final conclusions were approved by the Board of Trustees.

Broad Interests of the Community

All people were invited to take the survey, including general public, all community physicians, other primary care providers, dentists, optometrists, chiropractors, public health professionals, mental health professionals, healthcare workers, schools, government and business leaders. Communication of the survey opportunities was reported at the Board meeting, posted online, and covered by area media. A link was placed on the www.winmedical.org web site. Further characteristics of participants are noted as follows:

Section 4: Prioritized Description of Significant Health Needs

The online survey asked questions related to the community, personal health, COVID-19 impact and demographic information.

Community

The Community Health Assessment identified five overall priority categories of concern (gave a rating of 3, 4 or 5, with 5 being the highest level of concern):

- Housing Options 88%
- Mental Health Care 86%
- Older Adult Care 78%
- Alcohol and drug use 76%
- Suicide 68%

Additional areas which over 50% of respondents had high concerns:

- Racism 65%
- Prep for Natural Disaster 59%
- Tobacco − 59%
- Access to transportation 57%
- Accessible exercise facilities 54%

Personal Health

Most respondents felt they have overall good, very good or excellent health:

- Physical health 91%
- Dental health 92%
- Mental/emotional health 87%

The five most prevalent diagnoses among respondents were:

- Vision problems 40%
- Hypertension 20%
- Sleep apnea 13%
- Hearing problems 13%
- Respiratory problems 10%

The five highest areas of need for health care services (available, but does not meet needs; not available), according to survey respondents were:

- Access to mental health care 54%
- Shelter and services for victims of abuse, violence and assault 43%
- Alcohol and drug abuse prevention 38%
- Family planning services 32%
- Services for persons with disabilities 32%

Most respondents are covered by health insurance:

- Self 98%
- Spouse 93%
- Child(ren) 85%

Section 5: Implementation Strategy

Actions by Winneshiek Medical Center to Address Community Health Needs

Community Health Assessment – Improvement Plan

Community Health Need	Actions
Mental Health Care & Access/Suicide Prevention	 Continue to expand the Integrated Behavioral Health model, which works in conjunction with primary care at Winneshiek Medical Center. Recently hired a new LISW. Collaborate with Winneshiek County agencies to decrease incarceration and emergency inpatient admission for mental health crises. Offer tele-psychiatry through the Emergency Department. Expand WMC social worker capacity to assist with situations requiring emergency need for services not provided at WMC, but within the community. Continue to support local mental health/suicide awareness events in collaboration with other community agencies and regional mental health providers. Currently actively recruiting to add a psychiatrist and an additional psychologist to the community. Provide group therapy to improve access and lower costs: DBT, chronic pain and insomnia. Conduct suicide assessments as part of all patient encounters and ensure appropriate follow up.

Older Adult Care

- Offer full-service home health care (nursing and rehabilitation) and Hospice services.
- Supplier of durable medical equipment, including oxygen.
- Provide support to patients/community through the Senior Health Insurance information Program (SHIIP)
- Provide Chronic Care Management through clinic nursing staff for patients with two or more chronic conditions.
- Expand our team based care programming in primary care to enhance population health management.
- Participating in 2023 in the Medicare Shared Savings program accountable care organization to enhance the data we receive on population health metrics for our Medicare patients.
- Offer dementia care services for patients and caregivers in the region.
- Provide Skilled Care to the community for safe recovery from hospitalization or surgery.
- Support partner agencies in promoting community education events.
- Offer comprehensive Patient Financial Assistance services.
- Coordinate distribution of free coupons to Farmers Market (funded by Winneshiek County United Way) to senior citizens.
- Offer Mobile Meals (Meals on Wheels) program and Frozen Meals to support food security in the senior population.
- Employ two adult medicine nurse practitioners in the medical practice.
- Evaluating a palliative care program for patients.
- Provide medical directorship to area nursing homes.

Alcohol and drug use/prevention	 Opioid education provided to WMC staff and providers. Track quality metrics regarding the checking of the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP). Provide expanded social work services to patients through Decorah Clinic. Support partner agencies in promoting community education events. Interviewed a psychiatrist specializing in addiction services. Continue to collaborate with Helping Services for Youth and Families and Quit Line Iowa in providing smoking cessation packets to WMC patients. Promote area prescription drug drop off days/events.
